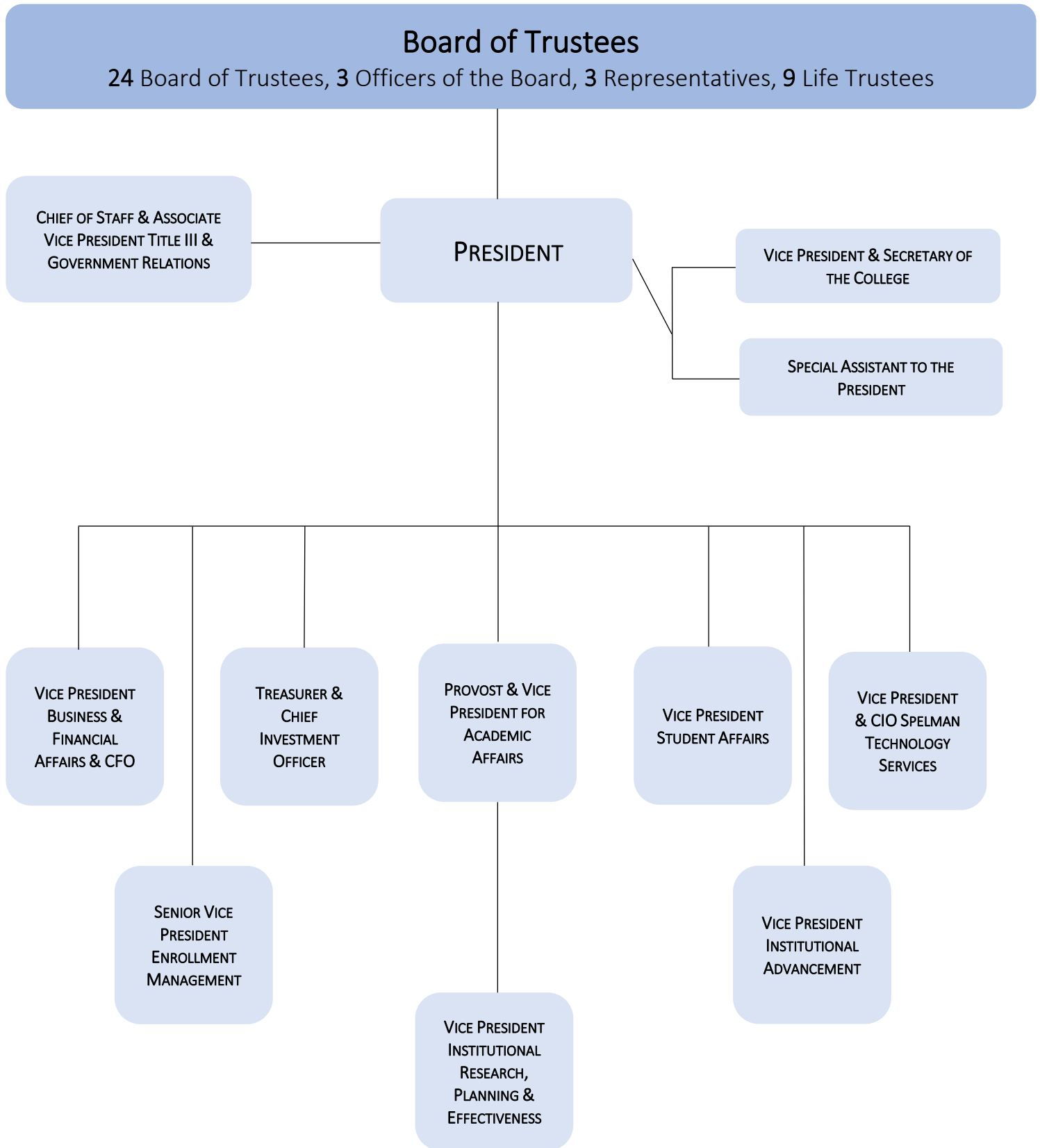

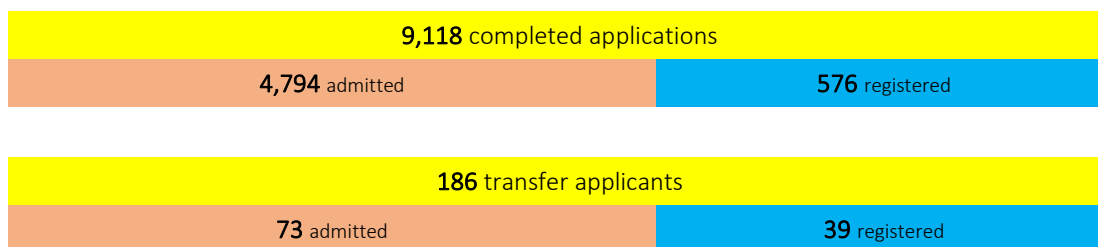

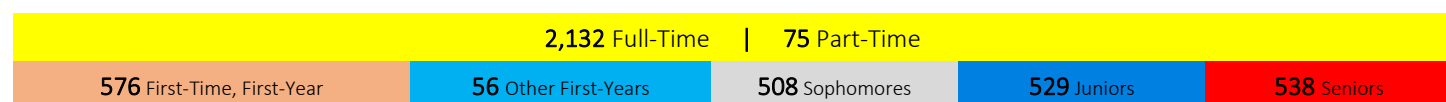

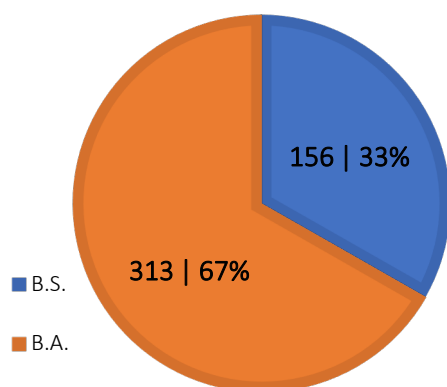

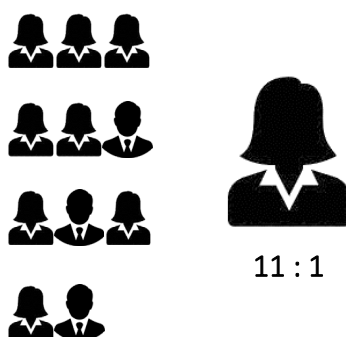

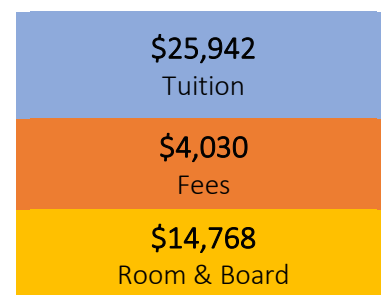

STUDENT-TO-FACULTY RATIO

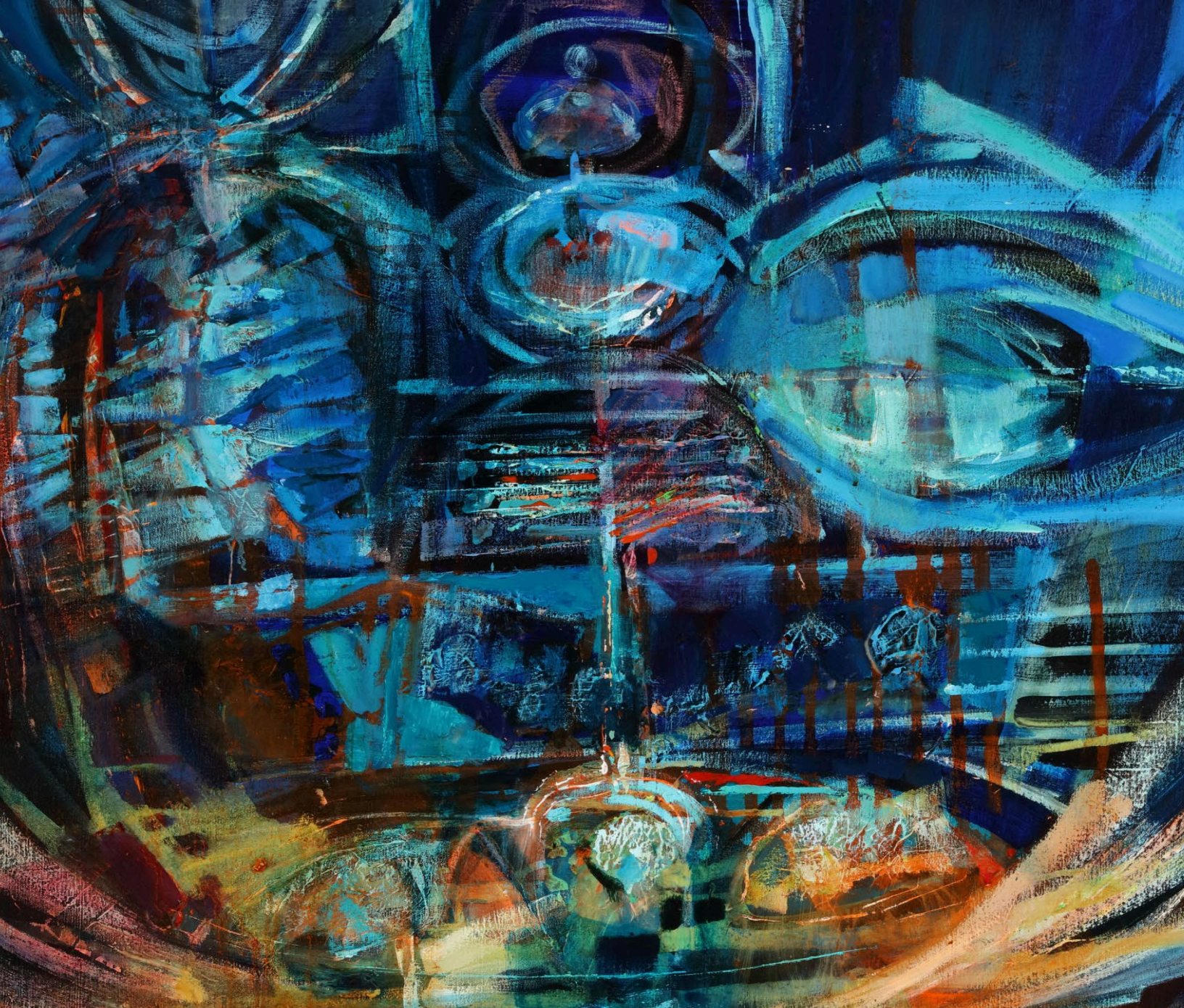


COST OF ATTENDANCE

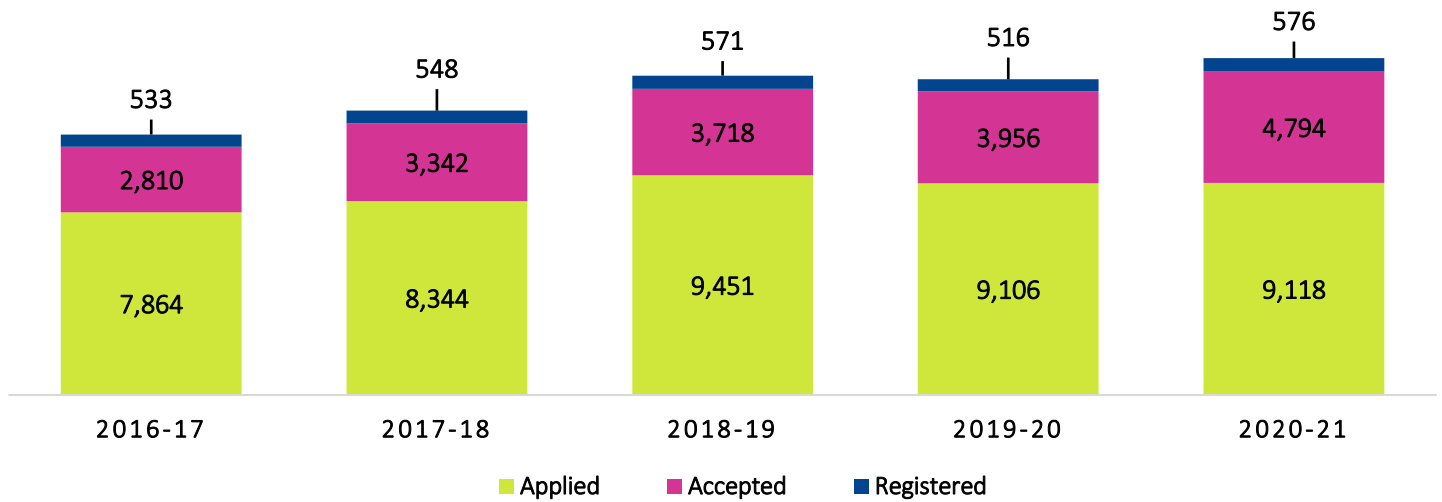

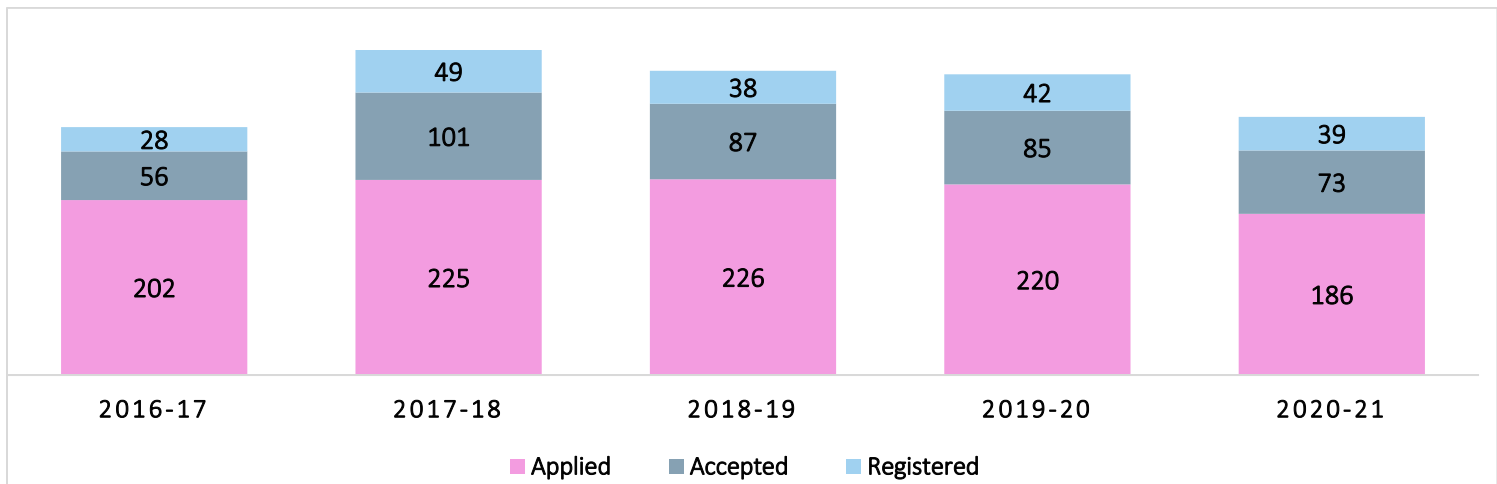

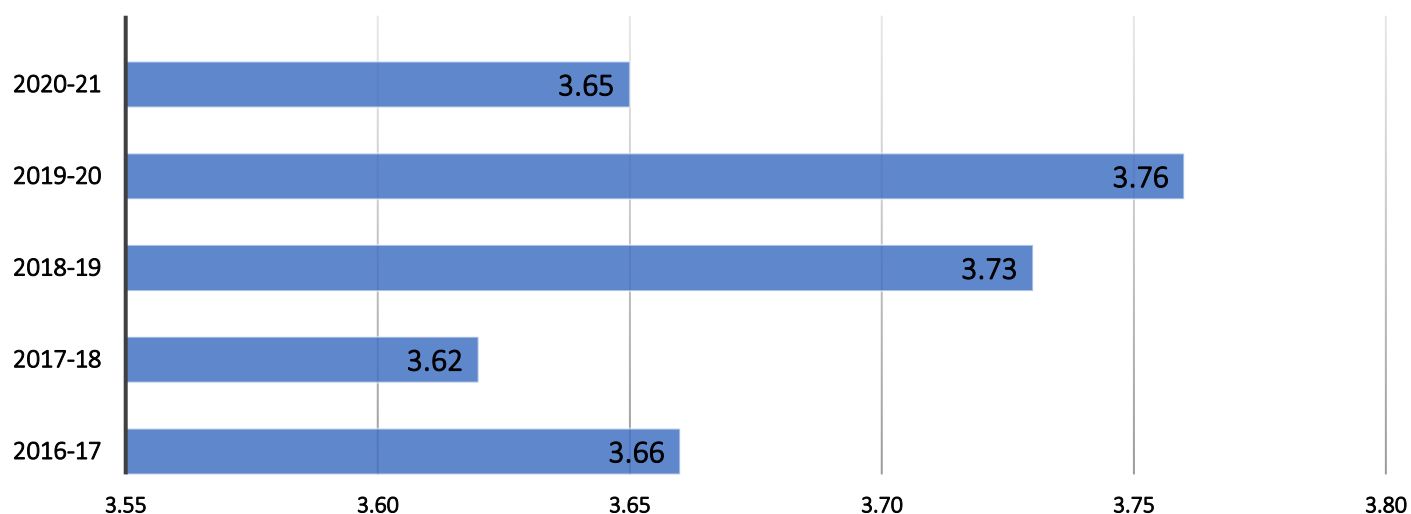

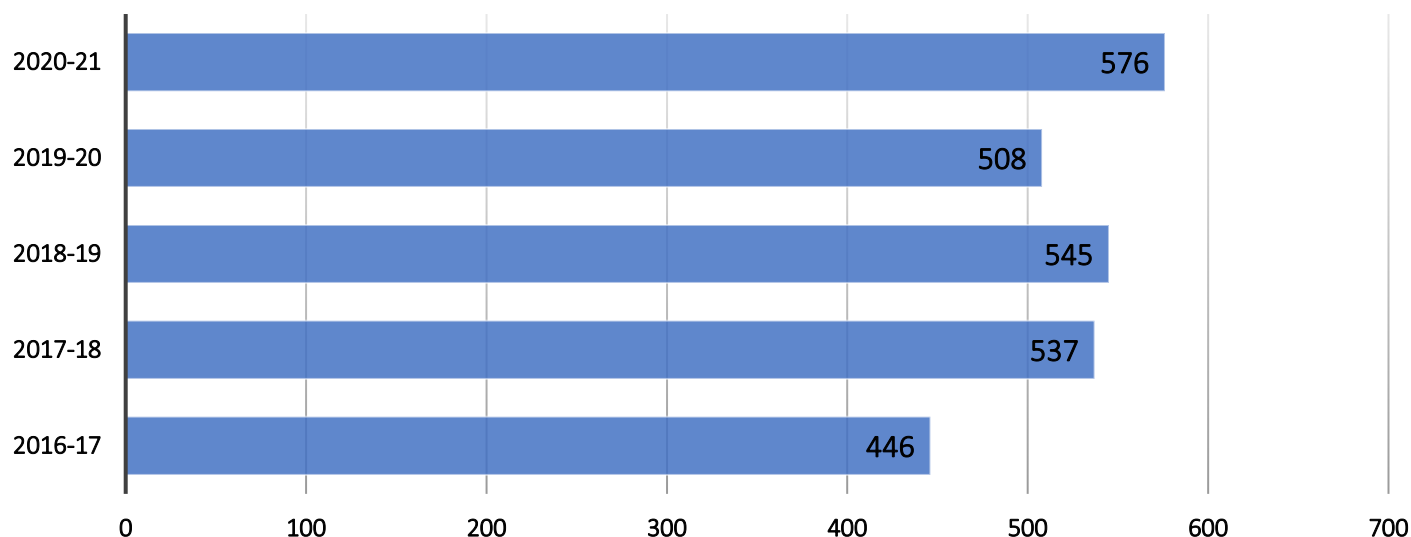

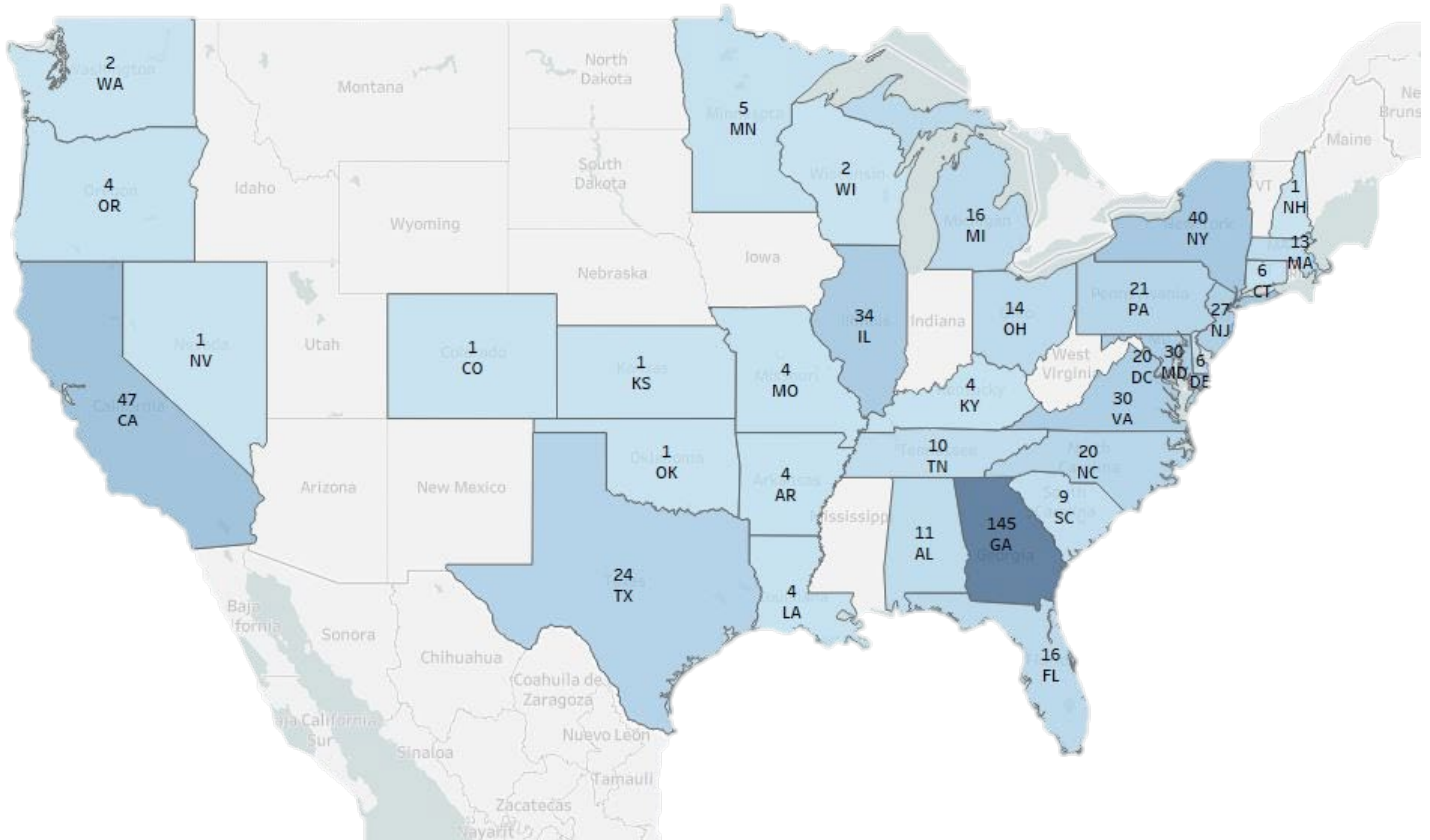

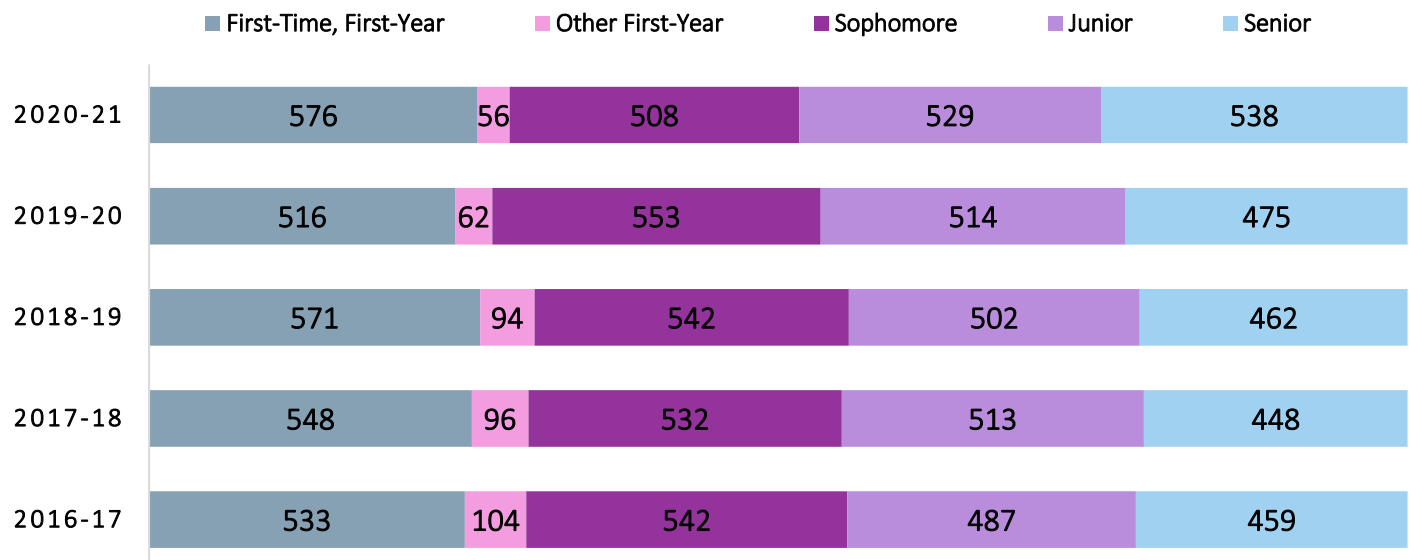

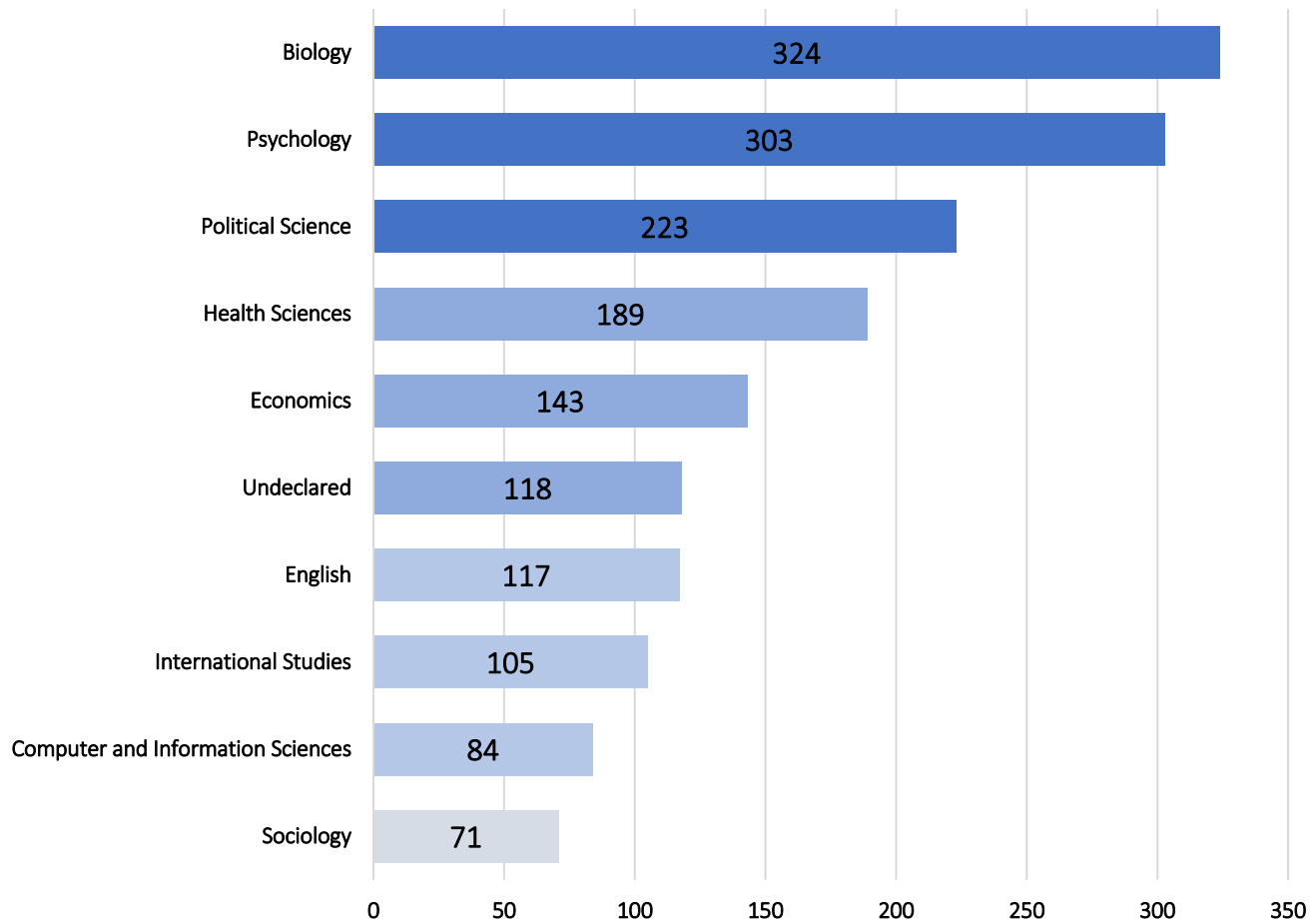

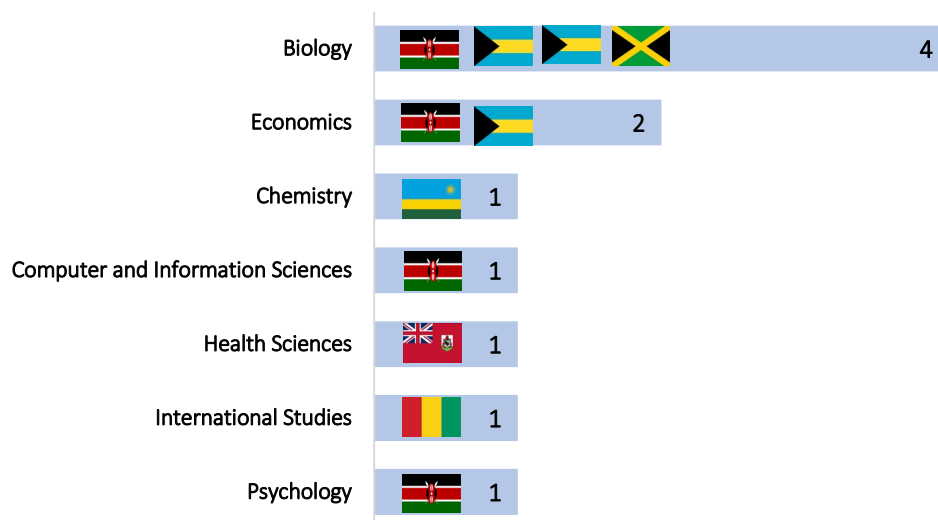

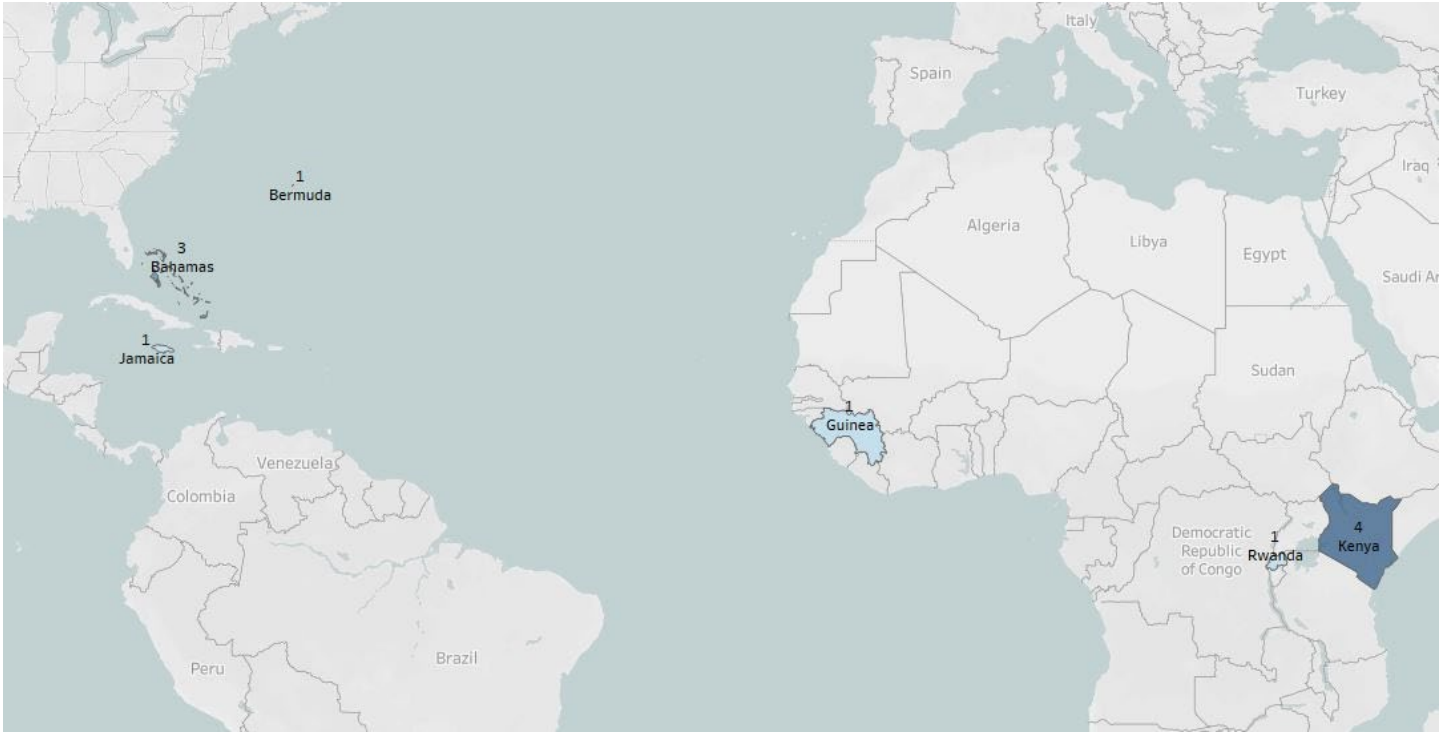

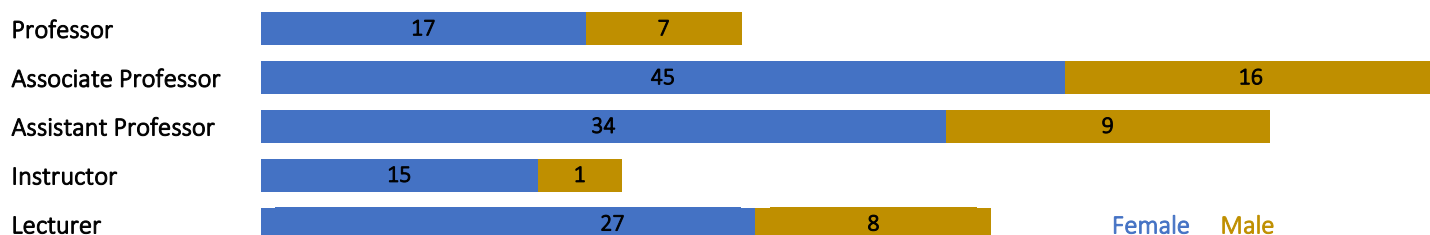
2020-21 Full-Time Faculty by Tenure Status



2020-21 Faculty by Degree Level



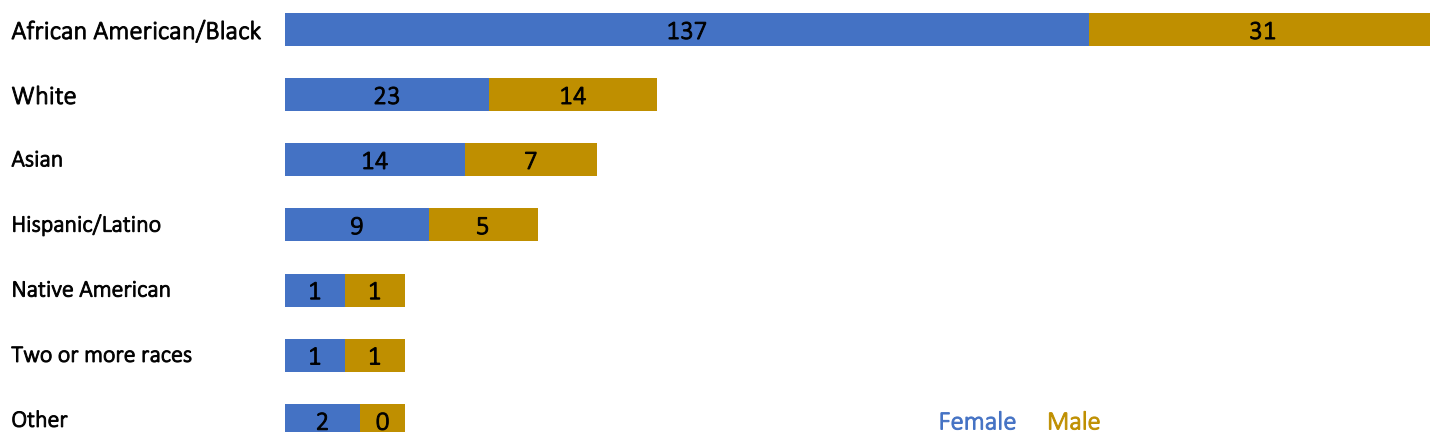

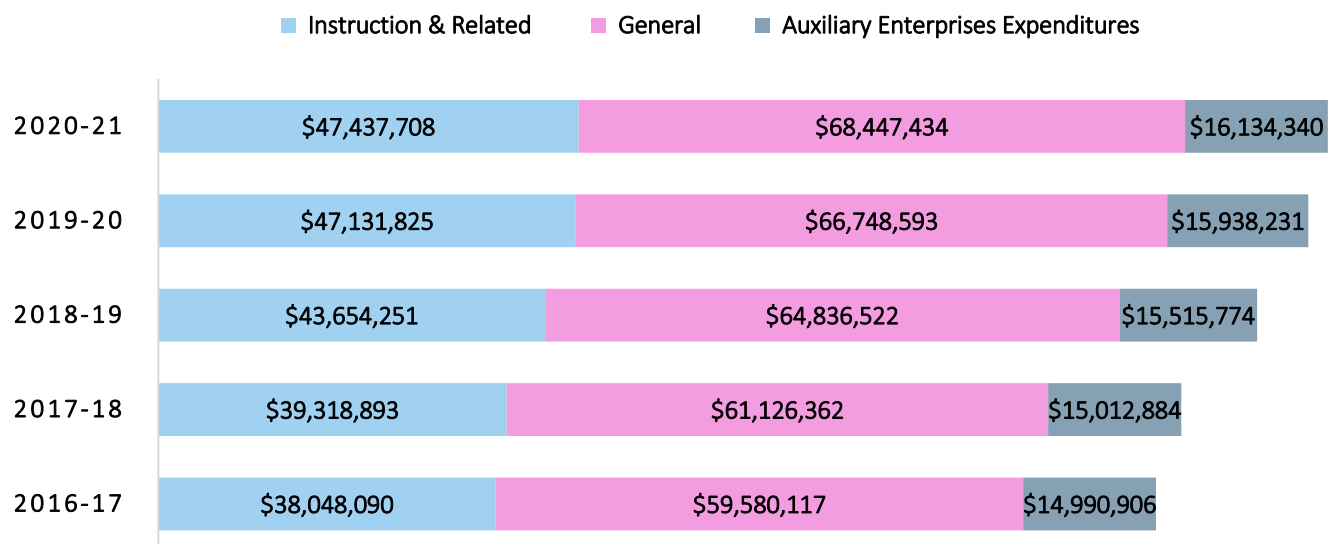

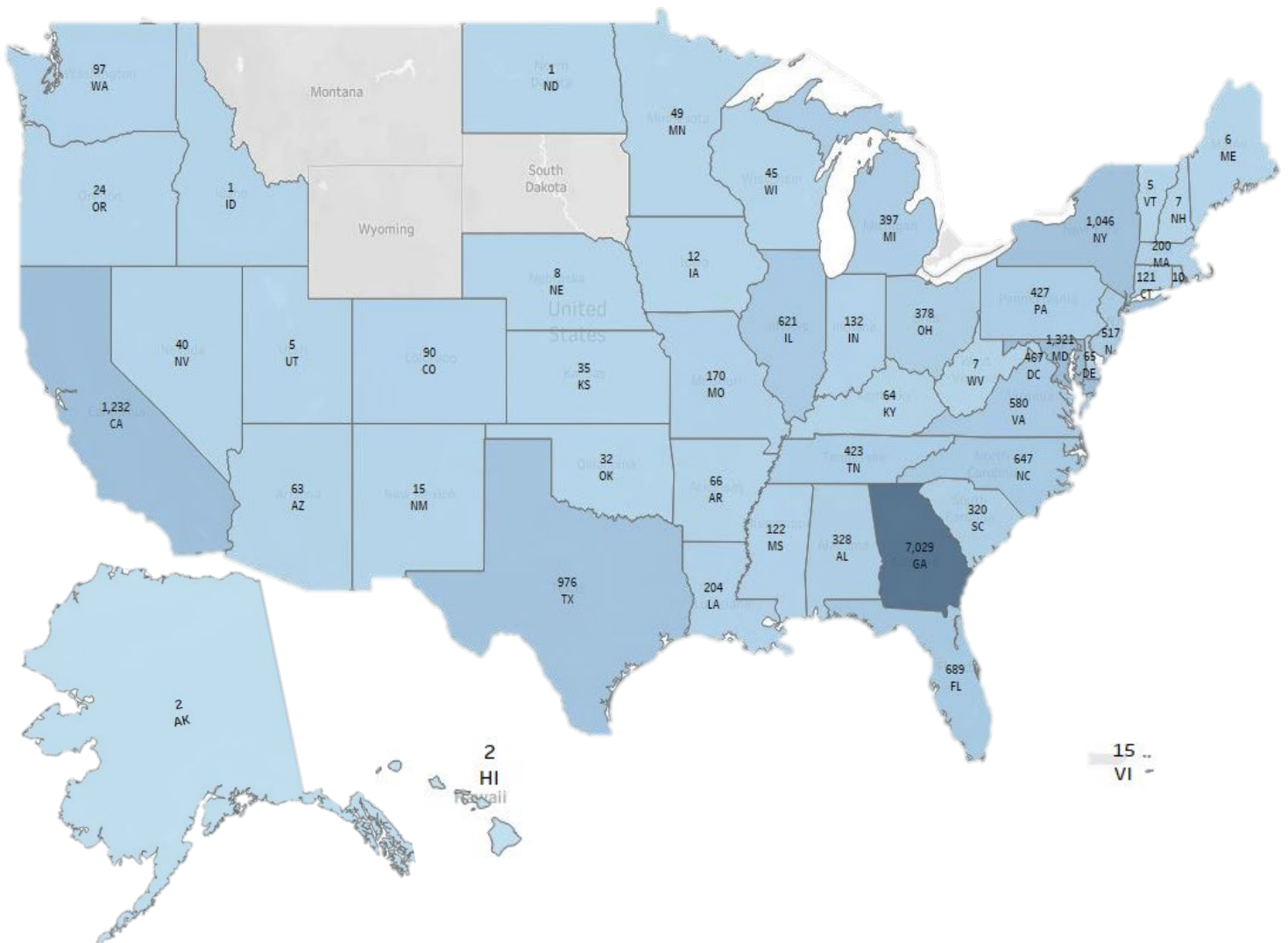
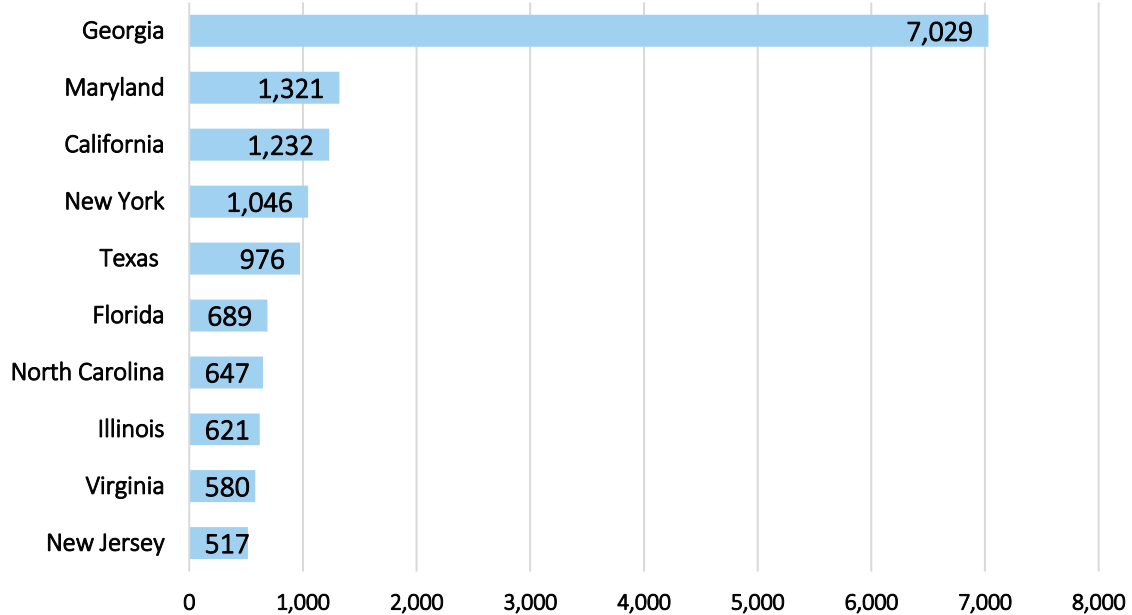

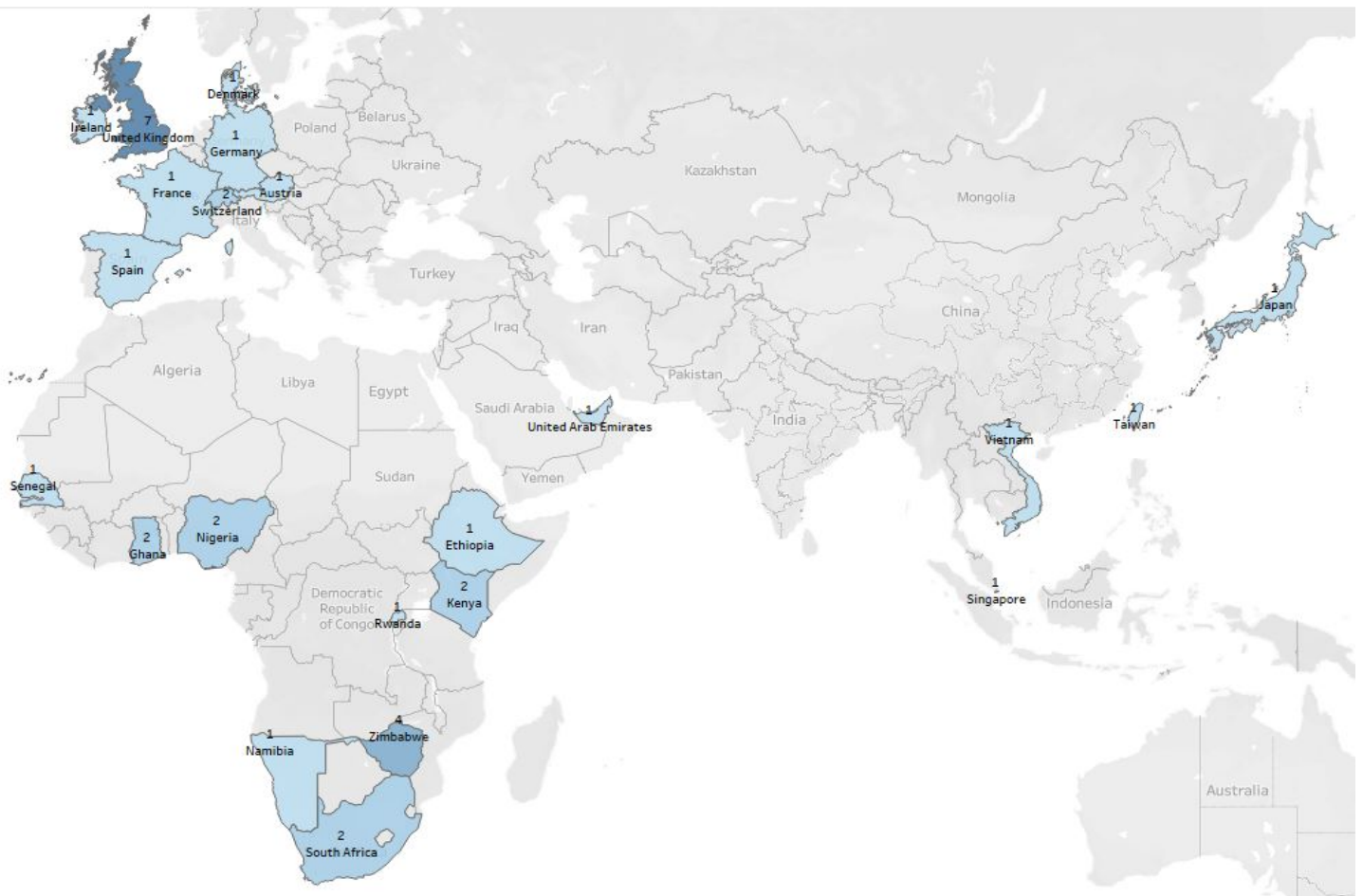
2020-21 Alumnae by State

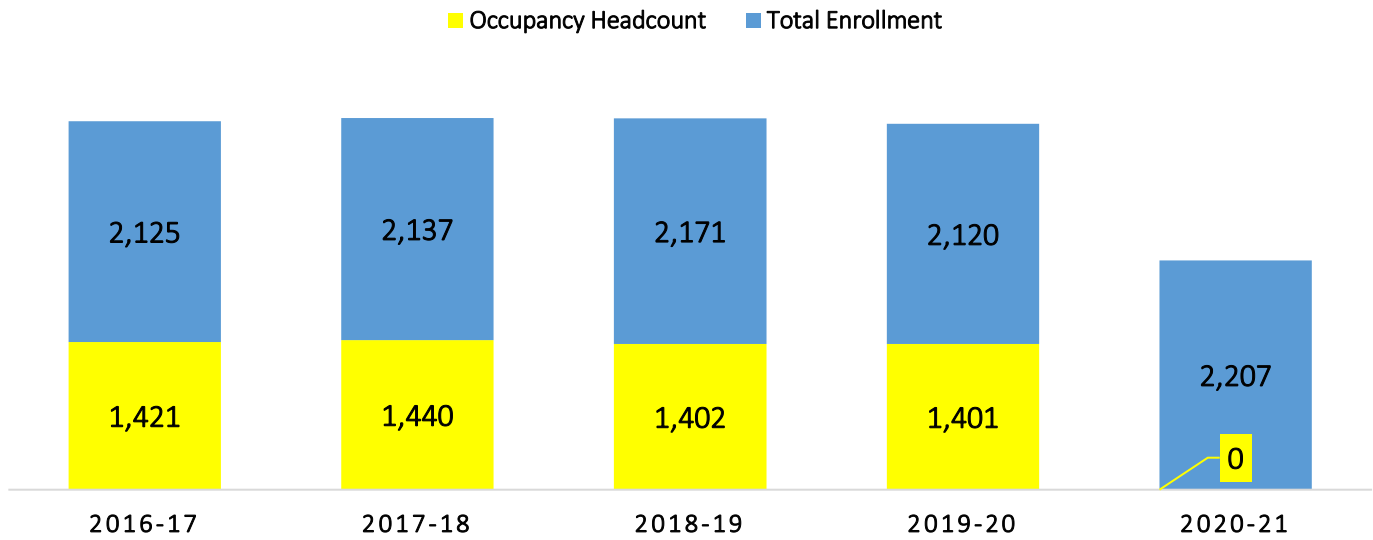

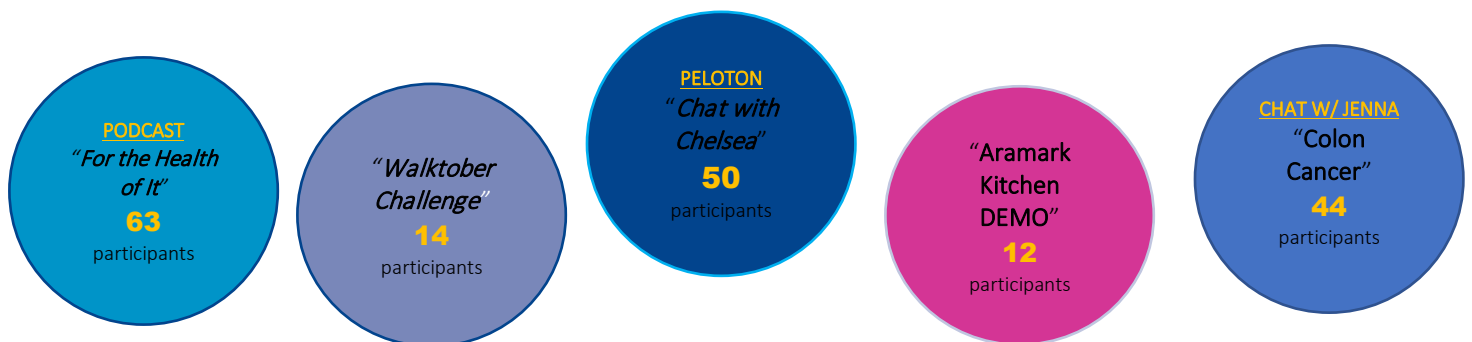
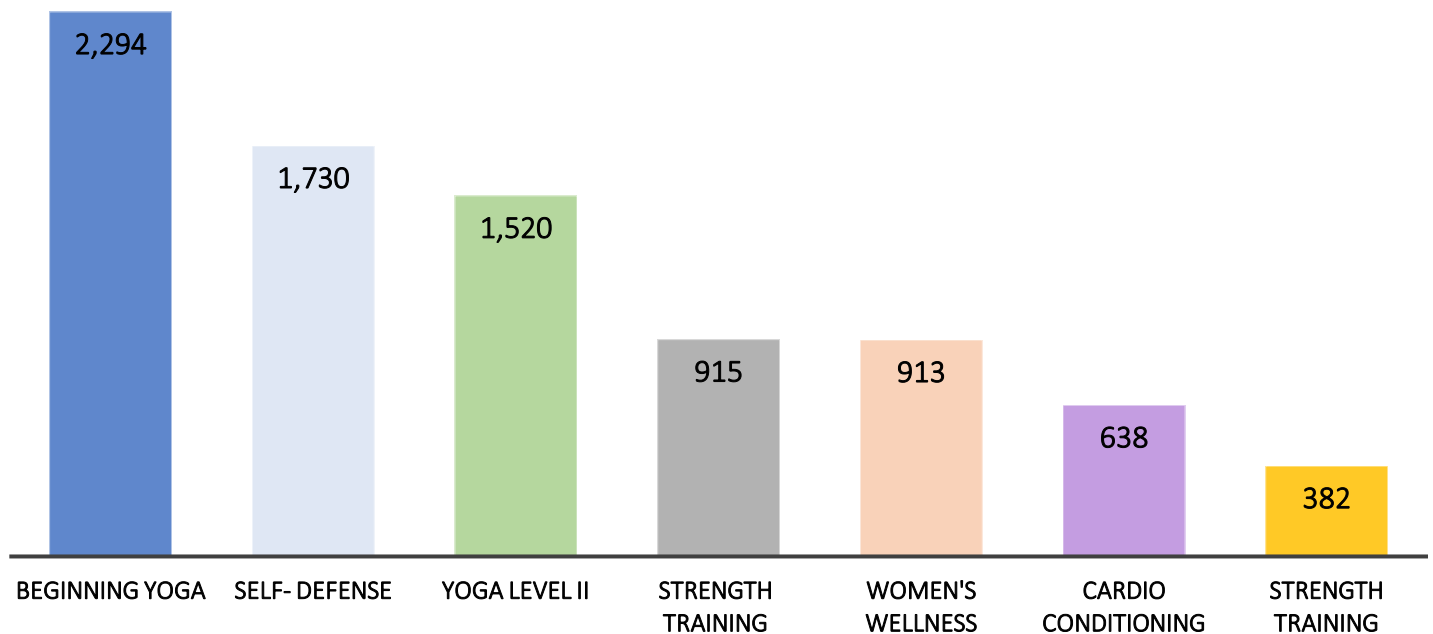
