





IPEDS Cohort (*FTFT*)



FIRST-TIME, FIRST-YEAR ADMISSIONS BY RESIDENCY PERCENTAGE








Transfer Student Admissions






High School Grade Point Average







Undergraduate Enrollment by Race or Ethnicity









Stewart Living & Learning Center (LLC I)




The Donald and Isabel Stewart Living-Learning Center, opened in 1983 and is named after Spelman's sixth president and his wife.

Morehouse-James Hall



Abby Aldrich Rockefeller Hall was built in 1952 in honor of John D. Rockefeller, Jr wife Abby Aldrich, a philanthropist and renowned patron of the Arts. In 2017, Abby Hall received renovations.

The Johnetta Betsch Cole Living-Learning Center II (LLC II) opened in September 1989 and is named after one of Spelman's successful presidents. She helped Spelman College through a difficult financial time and was honored for her efforts by having a residence hall named after her. Traditionally, this upper-class residence hall houses **201** students.

Beverly Daniel Tatum Suites (The Suites)



The Suites provides the opportunity for upper-class residents to enjoy apartment-style living in our newest residence hall. The Suites was built in 2008. In 2015, this residence hall was dedicated to former president Dr. Beverly Daniel Tatum upon her retirement.

The Suites houses **303** students with rooms varying in size from two bedrooms with one bathroom, three bedrooms with two bathrooms, or four bedrooms with two bathrooms.



Sally Sage McAlpin

Sally Sage McAlpin Hall was built in 1973. The upper-class residence hall was named for the woman who was then chairperson of the Board of Trustees.

McAlpin has **70** single rooms and **23** double rooms that have a privacy wall.

Dorothy Shepard Manley Hall (Manley)



Dorothy Shepard Manley Hall, built in 1964, honors Dorothy Shepherd Manley, wife of the fifth president of the College. Manley Hall houses **131** residents and has single, double, triple, and quad occupancy rooms.

Bessie Strong Hall



You may recognize Bessie Strong Hall from the television series, "A Different World." The upper-class residence hall was used as a background for the television program. Bessie Strong Hall was built in 1917 and named for John D. Rockefeller's oldest daughter.


The residence hall houses **10** students and has eight single rooms and one double room.

Howard-Harreld Hall (HH)



Howard-Harreld Hall (HH), is the largest first year residence hall built in 1968. The building was named for Clara Howard of the first Spelman High School graduating class and Claudia Harreld of the first College graduating class. Howard-Harreld Hall houses **184** first-year students.

> Laura Spelman Residence Hall



Laura Spelman Rockefeller Memorial Hall was built in 1918, After undergoing a complete renovation in 2012, Laura Spelman Residence Hall was reopened with new upgrades.

Laura Spelman is an upper-class residence hall housing **40** students on the second and third floors.

MacVicar Hall



Historically, MacVicar Residence Hall has served as a practice school for nurses in training. The Department of Student Health Services comprises the bottom floor of MacVicar Hall. This residence hall has **8** single rooms, where the residents enjoy camaraderie and peer support.


